

The Need and the Solution

Colorado is well known for its spectacular natural beauty, clear mountain streams and fantastic outdoor recreation – a huge boon to our economy. As population and recreation increases, while land management budgets shrink, our forests, streams and trails are suffering terribly. Thousands of volunteers are eager to help, but resources are needed to support those volunteers.

Wildlands Restoration Volunteers is a non-profit organization that engages thousands of volunteers each year in the restoration and stewardship of public lands in Colorado and Wyoming. Our volunteers restore areas burned by wildfire, restore streams and wetlands, construct and maintain trails, improve wildlife habitat, and much more.


WRV provides more than volunteer labor. We have empowered hundreds of active well training leaders through our volunteer leader development program. We also provide all our own tools and have excellent design expertise among our volunteers and staff.

Fourmile Canyon Fire Restoration, 465 volunteers, with smudges of ash from head to toe, completed five restoration events by collectively seeding over one million square feet of the burn area. These seeds are already growing to prevent noxious weed invasion, erosion, and protecting water quality in streams and rivers below.


